

As Jesus went ashore, he saw a great crowd; and he had compassion for them, because they were like sheep without a shepherd; and he began to teach them many things.

Mark 6:34

Jesus called his disciples and said to them, "I have compassion for the crowd, because they have been with me now for three days and have nothing to eat."

Mark 8:1b-2

ecently on social media, someone called a friend of mine a "bleeding heart liberal." It was not meant as a compliment. I'm not that surprised by the 'liberal' part; my friend is one, and unashamedly. But what had me scratching my head was the part about being a "bleeding heart" and why that would have to be a bad thing.

I understand that, in common usage today, it's meant to mean someone who gets upset over every little thing, and often over hurts that might be more perceived than they are real. But it still got me to asking myself, "why is this a bad thing?" If our hearts truly do bleed (figuratively) for those who are suffering, why is that a negative quality in an individual?

Twice, in the Gospel of Mark, the word "compassion" is used. Again, in common usage, this tends to mean 'pity' or 'sorrow' but this is not truly accurate to the origins of the word. Taken for its parts, we have the prefix *com*-meaning "with" or "alongside" and the root *pati* meaning suffering, as in "The Passion of Jesus" (his suffering and agony on the cross). Hence, at its truest and most accurate, compassion means to share in the suffering of another, to take on and help carry the weight of agony of another who is being crushed by the experience.

Jesus, in Mark 6, saw that the people were lost, looking for a new way, and were suffering such as lost sheep. He had compassion on them, and taught them, leading them as a shepherd would his flock.

Then again, in Mark 8, he saw that the crowds were hungry, starving for both physical and spiritual nourishment. Again, he had compassion on them, walking alongside them and choosing to ease the pain of their hunger.

And as the gospels' story progresses, Jesus goes to the cross and bears, with compassion, the weight of brokenness and separation in the world – separation from God and each other, relationships broken by sin – and in that compassion, his heart bleeds (literally).

As I write this, the violence, death, and broken relationships of this past month are still very fresh on my heart, and I grieve. Knowing that such violence and death is *not* indicative of the Kingdom of God (in which every tear shall be wiped from our eyes, and death and sorrow shall be no more), I cannot help but feel compassion, even to the point of having a bleeding heart, for the loss and heartache that exists, still, in our world.

But it doesn't stop there.

From feeling compassion, Jesus went on to action, seeking to change the current reality to more closely match the reality of the Kingdom. He taught, fed, and healed those in the crowds that came to him. Similarly, feeling compassion for those who hurt, our call is to work to ease their suffering.

We can do this in any number of ways, but I believe the first step, after asking for the presence of the Spirit, is to do what comes naturally to show the light of Christ in the places that seem to be the darkest. *May we all be blessed in such an effort, for the glory of God.*
