Dear Saints and Friends of Gregory Memorial,



A voice cries out: "In the wilderness prepare the way of the Lord, make straight in the desert a highway for our God. Every valley shall be lifted up, and every mountain and hill made low; the uneven ground shall become level, and the rough places a plain. Then the glory of the Lord shall be revealed, and all people shall see it together, for the mouth of the Lord has spoken."

Isaiah 40:3-5

Te've been rehearsing for the choral cantata for a few months now, and my favorite piece is the one in which these verses are sung. They are a joyous proclamation of hope fulfilled, of the nearness of the <u>Kingdom of God</u>, of the intimate <u>presence of God</u> manifest in our world by the incarnation – Christ, our Messiah, the Light of God come into the world.

While some tease me about not looking forward to Christmas too soon, I maintain that Christmas is all the richer for the hopeful expectation of Advent. And I do love Christmas, all the more because of these weeks which are now before us as we daily make our journey to the manger scene. In these verses, Isaiah reflected the hopeful expectation of the people of Israel to know God intimately among them, and this is still our hopeful expectation today. And in them, Isaiah speaks to the people of God what it is to not just wait, but to wait expectantly, hopefully, and with purpose.

In our waiting, we are not to twiddle our thumbs, but rather to reshape the world around us: a straight road through the desert, an easy path in the wilderness; uneven ground made level, mountains laid low and plains lifted up. The way of the Lord is one in which the distance between us and God, between us and each other, is made short and non-existent. Christmas is the time when the distance between us and God is erased; Advent is the season in which we strive to make our world reflect this vision.

And so, as Isaiah invited the people of God, so I invite you to work to make short work of the distance between you and God, to bring closer the relationships of this world. We'll be doing this in several ways over the next weeks. For instance:

On *December 3*, we will offer cookies and cocoa again to members of the community, following the

Christmas Parade. But this year we will be assisted by the Girl Scouts who have been meeting here, and we will not only work alongside them but will again have the opportunity to greet our neighbors.

On *December 8*, we will gather for chili and soup, but this year instead of a contest that Josh would undoubtedly win, we will then go out in a couple groups to go caroling to some of our shut-in members. It will be a joyful event for all, regardless of musical capability!

On *December 18* we will offer our choral cantata, "Noel Celebration," to the community, together reveling in the joyous proclamation of the good news of Christ's arrival.

On *December 21*, on the Winter Solstice, we will remember that while our hope is in the Light, our world too often is wrapped in the darkness of grief. Those who feel keenly the loss of family and friends are invited to the <u>Darkest Night</u> service, to be comforted and to light a candle in remembrance of loved ones.

And then, of course, we will gather on *December 24* for our candle-light Christmas Eve services. And as Christmas Day this year is on a Sunday, we will gather informally for a brief service of celebration on December 25, where we will sing carols and share the joyful stories of our Christmases.

All of this is to say, in this season we will be celebrating community, and working to do away with the distances which separate us from one another, and from God. Join us, and may our joy, together, be complete!


